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# **1. Important Travel Information**

### **Visa & Entry Requirements**

- Most nationalities can get a visa on arrival or require evisas before travelling. Check with the UAE immigration <u>website</u> for details.
- Your passport must be valid for at least six months from your entry date.

### **Currency & Payment**

- Currency: United Arab Emirates Dirham (AED)
- Credit cards are widely accepted, but carrying cash for small purchases is useful.

### **Mobile SIM Cards & Connectivity**

- Main Providers: Du & Etisalat (Available at the airport and malls).
- Free Wi-Fi is available in malls, hotels, and metro stations.
- Adaptor: Plug Type: UK-style Type G

## **Airport Transfers**

- Dubai International Airport (DXB) is the main airport.
- Transport options:

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- $\circ~$  Metro: Red Line connects the airport to significant areas.
- Taxis: Available 24/7 (cash & card accepted).
- Ride Apps: Uber & Careem operate.





# 2. Good to Know

### Local Dress Code & Cultural Norms

- Men: Light clothing is fine, but avoid sleeveless shirts and shorts in religious or formal settings.
- Women: Modest clothing is recommended, with shoulders and knees covered in public places. When visiting mosques, women should wear a headscarf and loose-fitting attire.
- Swimwear: Allowed at beaches, pools, and water parks but not in public areas like malls or streets.
- Public Affection: Holding hands is fine for married couples, but kissing and hugging in public can be frowned upon.

### **Prayer Times**

- The call to prayer happens five times daily and lasts a few minutes.
- During prayer time, some businesses may pause service briefly.
- Respect religious practices: Avoid loud conversations or music near mosques during prayers.
- Fridays: The most important prayer day; expect some shops to open later in the afternoon.

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### **Behaviour**

- Tipping: Not mandatory, but 10-15% is appreciated in restaurants.
- Language: Arabic is the official language, but English is widely spoken.
- Alcohol: Available in licensed hotels, bars, and restaurants but not in public areas.

# Public Behaviour: 🚫

- Avoid PDA, respect local dress codes, and follow cultural norms.
- Chewing Gum & Eating in Public Transport: Chewing gum, eating, or drinking on the Metro or public transport is not allowed.
- Photography: So Avoid taking pictures with drones or people, especially locals, without permission. Photographing government buildings, military sites, and public areas can have serious legal consequences.
- Swearing & Offensive Gestures: Using profanity, making rude gestures or insulting someone (even online) can result in fines, deportation, or jail time.

## Weather Forecast

- Temperature Range: 18°C 28°C (64°F 82°F)
- Generally pleasant with warm afternoons and cooler evenings.
- Little chance of rain but occasional breezes.

### What to Wear:

- Daytime: Light, breathable clothing (cotton, linen, or moisture-wicking fabrics).
- Evening: A light jacket or sweater for cooler temperatures.
- Shoes: Comfortable walking shoes or sandals.
- Accessories: Sunglasses, hat, and sunscreen for sun protection.
- Mosques & Religious Sites: Women should bring a scarf to cover their heads, and both men and women should wear modest attire (long pants/skirt and covered shoulders).
